4. Other Business

a. Proposed purchase of a Mini Greenhouse for raising microlaena seedlings for revegetation projects (Len)

Len had circulated a proposal (<u>Attachment B</u>) prior to the meeting for the purchase of a mini greenhouse to ensure that the microlaena seedlings he is raising will survive the winter and be ready for planting in spring. These will be used as part of a trial to revegetate the Weetangera paddock which is still struggling after the hazard reduction burn last year. The cost to fotpin is expected to be \$337.50.

The Committee discussed the proposal and agreed that this was a worthwhile expenditure. It is proposed to use some of the left over grant money (currently being held by Ginninderra Catchment Authority on our behalf) for this purpose.

Action: John to contact GCG to confirm that the grant money is still available and can be used for this purpose under the terms of the grant.

Attachment B. Proposal for purchase of mini-greenhouse

When I had a talk with Jen at Greening Australia she was uncertain whether my Microlaena seedlings would survive if left in the garden. I cannot purchase a cheap PE sheet greenhouse that will accommodate all the plants and go against my back garage wall. So I have investigate greenhouses and think that it could be worth FOTPIN purchasing one. I think that we should purchase one for the following reasons:-

- a) To ensure that all these 250 Microlaena seedlings are ready for planting this Spring.
- b) So that we can continue to germinate and grow about 250 ground cover plants the following years. There are a couple of areas in the Pinnacle that we gone to a lot of effort to get rid of a weed only to have it replaced by another and in one place to then get rid of that weed to have it replaced by several different weeds. This very disappointing and all because of the lack of native grasses and forbes in those areas. There is a lot of the reserve where this is probably occurring we just do not take note of it. If we purchase a greenhouse I am prepared to try to grow 250 grasses and year and Jean is prepared to help water the plants when planted. This should be a small start of the grass restoration in our weed management plan. However, because this is restoration it may attract some other people because it appeals to them more than weeding does.

It seems that:-

- polyethylene film has an R value of 0.83 and will last 2 to 3 years.
- 4mm twin wall polycarbonate has an R value of 1.43
- 6mm twin wall polycarbonate has an R value of 1.54
- 8mm twin wall polycarbonate has an R value of 1.69

The lifetime of polycarbonate depends on whether it is made from raw or recycled polycarbonate and also if it has a UV coating. The greenhouse I have chosen for value is made with 4mm twin wall, raw polycarbonate which is guaranteed for 5 years although by phone they said that it lasted much longer.

I would like to propose FOTPIN buying a Mini Grow Grande shelved \$325 -

https://www.growfreshgreenhouses.com.au/greenhouses/mini/grande.html If we can get all 250 plants to good size for early Spring that must go a fair way to paying off this greenhouse. Delivery is \$45 but they did offer 10% discount for a volunteer organisation, which is \$337.50 according to my calculation. The shelved version is necessary to take the tube trays.

It is possible to by replacement polycarbonate panels if they deteriorate - <u>https://www.growfreshgreenhouses.com.au/1500x750mm.html</u>

The size is just acceptable for the rear of the garage in the Winter. It looks like it is easily transportable so could be moved elsewhere and pegged down in the hotter months. I would fit a wooden floor and put a load of house bricks in the floor to hold it down and to retain some heat with their thermal mass. It would also be a good idea to thermally isolate the greenhouse from the concrete path by putting expanded polystyrene under the floor. Can probably salvage that from vegetable boxes from the Belconnen markets.

We do need to order it quickly before the hard frosts come.
